Tourists Will Soon Be Able to Walk the Sky at GOD'S WINDOW

he Mpumalanga Tourism and Parks Agency held an official sod-turning ceremony for the God's Window Skywalk in the Blyde River Canyon Nature Reserve during the celebrations of Tourism Month in 2021. Once complete in 2023, the project will allow visitors to experience one of South Africa's most iconic vistas in an entirely new way.

Located at the zenith of Mpumalanga's Panorama Route, God's Window offers visitors a panoramic view of the Lowveld more than 900 metres down into a lush indigenous forest-clad ravine. On a clear day, you can see as far as the Indian Ocean and Maputo. The skywalk will be a cantilevered glass walkway suspended off the edge of the cliff to give visitors a 360-degree panoramic view. The walkway will protrude about 12 metres out from the cliff and will be about 5 metres wide.

The Skywalk is designed to be a global iconic attraction with a number of activities on-site - the skywalk - a sky bridge - a sky swing - a zero-gravity room - a conference and meeting facility. The plan is for a significant part of the activities to be run by local unemployed youths from the area. With a 900 metre drop, the God's Window Skywalk will be higher than the Grand Canyon Skywalk, which stands at between 150 metres and 280 metres, and the Zhangjiajie Glass Bridge in China, which is 260 metres at its highest point.

The project is expected to greatly benefit the Mapulana Tribe, which owns the land on which the Skywalk is to be built. While the construction phase will be creating 300-plus job opportunities, it is expected to offer more than 100 jobs once complete and operational. Additionally, the community will get a shareholding in the concession through a special communal property association (CPA) named Blyde 04 CPA.

The procurement process for the skywalk, which was first envisioned in 2004, commenced in 2019 following the National Treasury Guidelines and the PPP Toolkit for Tourism to develop a state-of-theart facility. The development is to be procured using the design, build, finance, operate and transfer (DBFOT) approach. Mapulana Canyon (Pty) Ltd was appointed to invest, design, operate and manage the project, which will be transferred to the landowners at the end of the concession period. Mapulana Canyon is a unique partnership between Motsamayi

Tourism and Land Claimants from the Blyde River (The Blyde Valley Community Property Association). The concession for the site will be run by Motsamayi Tourism Group.

The Skywalk at God's Window is part of a broader effort by the Mpumalanga Tourism and Parks Agency to make the province a more competitive tourist destination. The Agency has also unveiled projects to further develop the Barberton Makhonjwa Mountains World Heritage Site and the Railway Heritage Tourism projects.

The Blyde River region attracts nearly one million visitors annually. Projects like the skywalk will do a lot to increase those numbers and encourage people to roam in the area for longer, which in turn will increase visitor spend to the region while exposing more people to one of South Africa's most beautiful locations. It will also be the first skywalk of its kind in South Africa, and one of a very few to have been built around the world.





20 TOURISM Students Get A Chance Of A Lifetime

ourism KwaZulu-Natal will give 20 unemployed students a once-in-a lifetime opportunity to be tourism ambassadors during this year's Africa Travel Indaba which starts today, 2 May 2022 at the Durban International Convention Centre.

The 20 students who also include some of the interns that recently completed their internship at Tourism KZN last month, will also be assisting delegates with directions, information services of what places of interests they can explore during their visit and so much more.

This is to ensure that delegates get the best of KZN. The Tourism Ambassadors will be stationed at key hotels as well as around the Durban ICC where they will be within eyeshot of any delegate that will need any information.

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Pilanesberg National Park

The crater of a long extinct volcano is the setting for the Pilanesberg National Park, and is one of the largest volcano complex of its kind in the world. Its rare rock types and structure make it a unique geological feature. Four concentric ridges or ring of hills fringe the area – the formation rises from the surrounding plains like bubbles.

Thanks to Operation Genesis (1979), the largest game translocation ever undertaken in the world at the time, the reserve now has in excess of 7000 animals. Well known for

NORTH WEST PARKS Madikwe Game Reserve

A theatre of conservation, a wilderness paradise, Madikwe

Game Reserve. The 63 000 ha reserve was established in 1991 in one of the largest translocation of the time - Operation Phoenix - when a total of 10 000 mammals were introduced to the park.

The reserve has an excellent record of environmental management which has ensured that the carrying capacity of the reserve is never exceeded to the detriment of the eco-system as a whole. The Madikwe Game Reserve conservation efforts to protect the endangered African Wild Dog, are yielding positive results. The reserve has a thriving wild dog population. The painted dogs being somewhat accustomed to the

its rich biodiversity of habitat, colourful hues, and panoramic views, Pilanesberg also offers visitors a close encounter with lion, leopard,

buffalo, elephant and rhino Africa's BIG 5. A wide variety of rare and common species exist with endemic species like the nocturnal brown hyena as well as cheetah, tsesebe and crocodile, a paradise for wildlife enthusiasts.

Pilanesberg covers an area of 50 000 hectare and exists within a transition zone between the dry Kalahari and the wetter Lowweld vegetation commonly referred to as the Bushveld. Bird watching is excellent with over 300 species of bird recorded. The early presence of man can be seen in the numerous Stone and Iron Age sites that are scattered throughout the reserve.

Visitors are offered many opportunities to experience the wonders of the park through guided game drives or self-drives, a map guide is available on sale at the entrance gates. The 200km of good tar and gravel roads transverse the park and are driveable by ordinary sedan. Hiking trails, dawn and sunset game drives in open safari vehicles and early morning balloon safaris are available and can be booked with specialist operators.

Numerous hides and scenic picnic sites enable the visitor to enjoy an 'out-ofcar' experience. A shop and restaurant are centrally located in the park. Curios are also available at the craft market situated at the entrance gate. A wonderful array of accommodation is offered on the periphery of the park ranging from luxury exclusive hotels and game lodges, cosy guest houses and B&B, caravan and camping sites.

The must visit Mphebatho Museum offers the local history of Bakgatla-Ba-Kgafela and state of the art displays are yours to explore. The Moruleng Mall caters for your shopping needs with many of the modern chain stores and restaurants available just 2km outside the Bakgatla Gate.

There are five entrance gates for visitors to the reserve

At Madikwe Game Reserve you will experience the African safari adventure where you will be taken to the heart of a pristine environment to witness the interaction of the many species, including the African Big 5,other plains species such as the cheetah, hippo and the spotted and brown hyenas and more than 300 bird species.

Madikwe is a low density tourism facility offering fully catered accommodation at several luxury lodges within the reserve, and is not open to day visitors. Game drives, in open safari vehicles are accompanied by professional guides.

The reserve is situated 90km north of the town of Zeerust against the Botswana Border. It is a three hours' drive from both Johannesburg and Pretoria. Visitors are also able to fly in using an air charter flight operating from Wonderboom Airport in Pretoria.

The climate is generally mild to hot, but winter nights can be extremely cold. Warm clothing is essential for early morning and night drives. Gate times are arranged for pre booked residents only. Madikwe is not open to day visitors.

LET'S TAKE A SHORT LEFT TO KWAZULU-NATAL

waZulu-Natal is the region wellknown for its green pastures and warmest beaches. KwaZulu-Natal is a traveler's dream, with a seemingly perpetual never-ending summer, offered by its subtropical climate. KwaZulu-Natal is famous for its outdoor activities, including beaches, natural environment, sport, surf, fishing, sailing, snorkeling and scuba diving. Other water related activities include, adrenaline junkies which can regarded as the world's highest gorge, bungee jump go mountain biking, white water rafting, or even do some ice climbing in the snowy mountains in winter.

There are plenty of opportunities to experience and enjoy region; KwaZulu-Natal rich in history and has an attractive diversity of cultures. This gives visitors endless authentic and fascinating opportunities to learn about, meet and interact with South Africans from all walks of life. Cultural diversity is apparent everywhere, in the traditional and contemporary music, dance, architecture, theater and art even in the agriculture of local people. In addition there are always plenty of exciting local and international culturary delights awaiting for exploration.

Durban remains the heart of tourism

in KwaZulu-Natal. A best way in experiencing the City is in taking a stroll along Durban's Golden Mile, a busy seafront connecting some of the city's top tourists attractions. Such attractions include Moses Mabhida Stadium, uShaka Marine World, Entertainment venues, high-rise hotels, shops and restaurants line. This sun-splashed strip and golden beaches here attracts surfers and swimmers. KwaZulu-Natal is a province where domestic and international travelers love to play. The province consists of various top attractions that are rich in history and diversity cultures.

"Drakensberg mountains", is a breathtaking beauty and one of the most popular destinations in the country. Pointed backed-peaks rises above dense forests and deep valleys, and cascades feed clear mountain streams. This breathtaking site includes numerous attractions within it, for instance, uKhahlamba-Drakensberg Park, Royal Natal National Park, Mont-aux-sourced, Giants Castle Game Reserve and Cathedral Peak.

This beautiful mountain region also offers luxurious accommodations and hospitality for visitors. KwaZulu-Natal is also well known for offering a thriving Zulu culture, from arts, cuisine and culture.

Other attractions of this province are deeply rooted in heritage, history and nature conservation. This includes "The Nelson Mandela Capture Site" outside the town of Howick in the Midlands area of the province. This province consists of the country magnificent world heritage sites like iSimangaliso Wetland Park on Elaphant coast. Another important Game Reserve is iHluhluwe-Imfolozi, world famous for the role it has played in preserving Africa's white Rhino populations. In addition, there are many more state run and privately owned protected natural areas to suit travelers. This includes Oribi Gorge Nature Reserve, about 120 Kilometers South of Durban. Oribi Gorge is well known for its great surfing and swimming beaches and lots sunshine.

Another protected natural area is the KwaZulu-Natal Battlefields Route. This site is known for its historical significance, as the site of many historic battles between Zulus, Boers, and British.

Today, sightseers can explore this rich history battlefields route. The battlefields consists of numerous routes, namely Isandlwana, Borke's Drift, Vryheid, Blood River Heritage Site and Fort Nongqai. Furthermore includes Sani Pass, one of South Africa's most attraction mountain roads. This attraction connects KwaZulu-Natal with the Kingdom of Lesotho. Another nature reserved area is Nambiti Private Game Reserve, which is about three hour drive from Durban.

Nambiti Private Game Reserve offers exciting guided Safari adventures in search of the Big Five; Leopard, Lion, Elephant, Buffalo and Rhino. The Tatham Art Gallery is a must see for art lovers. The gallery is situated in Pietermaritzburg and holds significant history of KwaZulu-Natal and South Africa.

LET'S TAKE A SHORT LEFT TO NORTH WEST

he North West province of South Africa is situated on the North by Botswana, on the South by the region's of Free State and the Northern Cape, and on the upper east east by the Limpopo province and Gauteng. A significant part of the province comprises of trees and grasslands. The Magaliesberg Mountain range in the upper east reaches out around 130 km from Pretoria to Rustenburg. Besides its relativity to nature, North West is a province rich in South African his conservation.

Significant historic sites in the province include Mafikeng, the traditional capital of the Barolong people. This is where a British post was set under attack by Afrikaners during the Boer war (1899-1902). Another destination include Lotlamoreng cultural village close to Mafikeng, which remains a conventional African town; and Boekenhoutfontein, the ranch of Paul Kruger, who was the last leader of South African Republic. This is not commoditised travel."

This is Sanghrajka's third visit to Africa's Travel Indaba, his first being in 1996. He said that the event has been instrumental to his company's growth and success over the years. To exhibitors, all he asks is that they be proud to be showcasing to international buyers. "You have used the last two years to test new ideas, to pivot, to implement new health protocols and innovate. There are many quality and serious buyers who, like yourself, have survived and are anxious to sell Africa." He added that buyers should meet as many exhibitors as possible learn about all the wonderful and diverse products in Africa. "Support those who have invested their time and resources to making the first post-pandemic Indaba a great success."

Vivan Perez, the Chief Travel Architect of US-based tour operator Ladies Touch Events & Travel, said she is looking for products catering for women travellers, particularly from the LGBTQ+ community. "A lot of women have been saying they are interested in Africa."

Perez added that she is also looking for products that keep travellers protected from Covid-19. "Even though we are post-pandemic, people are still worried about contracting the virus while travelling."

FOREIGN ARRIVALS TO AFRICA ON THE UP

According to the United Nations World Tourism Organisation (UNWTO), Africa had seen 18.5-million foreign arrivals in 2021, 2.3-million than 2020. North Africa had received 6.1-million of that figure while sub-Saharan Africa welcomed 12.3-million visitors. The UNWTO expects the sector to return to pre-Covid levels in 2023.

The signs of recovery are already there, as international air traffic in Africa increased 18% in January 2022, according to the UNWTO. According to Smith Travel Research, a data-driven market research group for the global hospitality industry, hotel occupancy around the world improved in February 2022 (51 percent) from weaker rates in January (43 percent). All world regions saw higher occupancy rates in February with a 48 percent increase in Africa.

South African Tourism Acting CEO, Themba Khumalo, said that since Covid-19 lockdown regulations have been relaxed worldwide, he expects tourist numbers to increase even more by the end of 2022.

He added that Africa's Travel Indaba will do much to ensure that foreign travellers choose one of 54 African countries as their destination of choice.

"I have no doubt that the international buyers will be bowled over by the diverse African products at Indaba. There is something for all.



Hidden Gems Of Limpopo Exposed To The World

YELLOW ARUM LILY IN SEKHUKHUNE

Sekhukhune District is endowed with types of yellow arum lily which germinates between the two is that the Zantedeschia Jucunda has deep green leaves with white sparkles while its cousin, Zantedeschia Pentlandia gem in the province, a unique geological formation of an active Sekweneng tufa rock. Mr. Lucious Hlatshwayo, the lead tour guide with his extensive knowledge of nature, will be on duty to enlighten you about these wonders of nature. According to Wikipedia, Tufa is a variety of limestones formed when carbonate minerals precipitate out of ambient temperature water. Geothermally heated hot springs sometimes produce similar (but less porous) carbonate deposits, which are known as travertine. Tufa is sometimes referred to as (meteogene) travertine. It should not be confused with hot spring (thermogene) travertine. Tufa, which is calcareous, should not be confused with tuff, a porous volcanic rock with a similar etymology that is sometimes also called "tufa".

The other family of this lily is Zantedeschia pentlandia found around Roossenekal in the same district. The difference are shiny plain green.

This is the time when people descend to Leolo Mountain ranges for sight seeing as well as exploring the rare species like the other family of the yellow arum lily that grows in the wild around that area, whose botanical name is Zantedeschia Jucunda. This genome of the yellow arum lilies is endemic to Mohlake Valley and the surrounding.
