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AFRICA COLLABORATION To Drive Tourism Growth And Recovery

frica's Travel Indaba officially opened yesterday with a call for the continent to work collaboratively to drive tourism growth, so as to accelerate the sector's recovery.

On a balmy day at the Inkosi Albert Luthuli International Convention Centre, over 634 and 625 buyers took their place at the continent's premier travel trade show, as it opened its doors after a three-year hiatus.

Minister of Tourism Lindiwe Sisulu officially opened the trade floor today, effectively putting into motion 22,000 scheduled meetings between exhibitors and buyers. "Africa's Travel Indaba is a springboard for the continent to achieve even greater levels of recovery. We are here because we have a collective responsibility to reignite the African continent's tourism growth and economy."

Sisulu called for greater collaboration among African countries to advance tourism on the continent, particularly when it comes to domestic and regional travel. "As we do business, we must remember that our continent is also our own market. All countries in Africa have potential for domestic tourism growth. Intra-continental tourism from Africa's rapidly growing economies and growing middle class is

an opportunity begging to be explored. We need improved collaborative efforts between our countries to achieve this."

Sisulu said all role players in the industry must continue to drive growth in tourism numbers by bringing together a range of Africa's best and most unique stories and products from across the continent, and connecting them with buyers from across the world.

She added that the event is about reigniting the spark in old relationships and building new, meaningful connections. "As a sector, we are here to cement our partnerships and collaborations. It can only be to our benefit that we are a sector committed to sharing ideas and knowledge, in a bid to ensure that we advance our Tourism Sector Recovery Plan."

INTERNATIONAL ARRIVALS INCREASING

According to the United Nations World Tourism Organisation, the continent welcomed some 18.5-million foreign travellers in 2021, up from 16.2-million in 2020. Of that figure, 6.1-million made their way to North Africa and 12.3-million went to sub-Saharan Africa. Furthermore, the UNWTO showed that January 2022 experienced a 51% improvement in international tourist arrivals compared to January 2021.

But according to Sisulu, Africa continues to struggle with numerous barriers to tourism growth, which include poor road infrastructure between major cities, limited airlift and stringent immigration regulations.

"I have had several engagements with my fellow cabinet members in related departments, in a bid to partner and address these challenges as we together work towards our sector's recovery. We have already seen positive developments around the roll-out of the e-visa regime for some our key source markets. This is not only important for South Africa's tourism sector recovery, but also for the greater continent's intra-trade activities," she said.

A UNWTO report on 25 March this year mentioned that international tourism is expected to continue its gradual recovery in 2022. By the end of March, 12 destinations had no COVID-19 related restrictions in place and an increasing number of destinations were easing or lifting travel restrictions, which contributes to unleashing pent-up demand.

he vibrant mini-marketplace of the Sustainability Village once again graces Africa's Travel Indaba and showcases to the world quality local products made by talented craftspeople and entrepreneurs.

A mainstay at every South African Tourism event, the Sustainability Village creates market access for SMMEs and ensures inclusive growth as the tourism sector gears up for recovery.

Africa's Travel Indaba's trade floor officially opened on , 3 May, at the Inkosi Albert Luthuli Convention Centre in Durban. Themed Africa's stories, your success, all delegates are invited to share their stories with each other and write their own success. For the African tourism industry. In order to meet the sustainability criteria, the goods featured have to be locally made. The other requirement is for vendors to be certified as a Black Economic Empowerment compliant South African business that contributes to the local economy.

ENTREPRENEURS DOING IT FOR THEMSELVES

Entrepreneur, Gugu Bhengu, is displaying her African-styled accessories and interior decor through her company Gugu Mobile Boutique. Her product range includes lampshades, place mats and shoes.

Bhengu, however, is most proud of the training she has provided to some 60 entrepreneurs from various local communities. "We teach them how to produce marketable products and make sure they can earn a living for themselves and their families. So far I have trained 50 to 60 people who are marketing their products for themselves and they are doing very good." Nomfundo Dlamini, the founder of Isimodeni Jewellery, said that customers are guaranteed an authentic piece of South Africa when purchasing from her stall. "Our pieces always stand out. They are conversational pieces." Dlamini's custom -made jewellery, inspired by traditional beaded accessories, gets people asking the wearer where they can find such pieces. "It is locally handmade, not mass produced. It is made by Nomfundo. And that makes you feel special, knowing that it is an item nobody else has."

Having always dealt with precious metals, Dlamini is looking to incorporate precious stones into her future collections.

Ntokozo Ngidi, the founder of Arts Unity, is showcasing his handcrafted wire and bead key holders and animal figurines. "Our slogan for the company is, 'Bringing love and happiness through art.' Through our arts we strive to bring happiness to our customers. By purchasing to our product and giving it to someone as a gift, that is where the love comes from."

Ngidi uses 16 gauge galvanised steel wire (gauge being the thickness of steel) to make the frames of his designs. He then uses a 0.7 gauge galvanised wire to insert the beads. "From there, I craft it on the frame to [make the] finished product."

LET'S TAKE A SHORT LEFT TO GAUTENG

auteng is well known as the province with the most economic activity and highest population. This is due to the fascinating attractions that the province entails. This includes, exhibition halls, art galleries, and historical sites. Gauteng is additionally a diversion playground offering top notch cafés, shebeens, shopping centers and music scenes.

The province is the business and modern force to be reckoned with in South Africa. Gauteng is a cosmopolitan blend of individuals from varying backgrounds, from all edges of the world. In Gauteng the nightlife is magnificent, with a considerable lot of the nation's most sweltering bars, eateries and clubs situated here. It is likewise a shopping sanctuary, with shopping centres offering global creator products close by privately delivered designs - an optimal objective to get some South African high fashion.

The Apartheid Museum is every bit as fascinating and impressive as the guides claim. There is no better way to make sense of the city's and country's experiences than this. It's also regarded as large part of the Gauteng experience.

The Constitutional Court is housed here, and it was built on the site of the Old Fort Prison Complex, Number Four. The courthouse is still one of the city's most important historical sites. It also has a unique architectural style that distinguishes it, making it a fitting emblem of democracy. Constitution Hill portrays the intriguing, and at times tragic, story of actual South African history, a past marred by social, cultural, and political injustices. At Constitution Hill, the journey to this state of liberty is traced and brought to life through a variety of tours and exhibitions.

Furthermore, in destinations that travelers can experience in Gauteng, includes Hector Pieterson Memorial. Hector Pieterson has turned into an iconic image that holds significant memory of the day, with Hector's sister close to him, her hands loosened up in dread. Today, June sixteenth, is National Youth Day, a day put away to perceive and respect youngsters. Another rich historical site to be experienced when visiting Gauteng is Nelson Mandela Bridge. The bridge is a magnificent beacon that lights up the sky at night, its massive span dominating the horizon among the city skyscrapers and admired by numerous South Africans and visitors alike from the M1 freeway.

The province preserves a significant historical destination that relates to South Africa's liberation. The Union Buildings in South Africa's capital, Pretoria, were designed by Sir Herbert Baker in the English amazing style and sit on a hilltop overlooking the city. The Union Buildings are the authority seat of the South African government and house the workplaces of the President of South Africa. Another destination site that preserves liberation history of the country is The Freedom, opened in December 2007. It is regarded as one of the most ambitious heritage projects the government has invested in. The Park is established on the cornerstones of human dignity, rights and freedom and reflects the sacrificial

achievements of the nation.

The Walter Sisulu National Botanical Garden in Roodepoort, Gauteng, is almost 300 hectares of landscaped and natural veld that is a haven for birds. bright blue cloudless sky and warm sunshine welcomed more than 4 000 international and local delegates at Africa's Travel Indaba at the Inkosi Albert Luthuli International Convention Centre Complex in Durban on Tuesday.

We count the damage from the floods in billions of rand, but importantly, we are here to tell the story of our resistance and resilience even as we have experienced this catastrophe so soon since the start of the Covid-19 in 2020.

"Perhaps we more than others, have been challenged severely by these two disasters, and yet we remain grateful for the overwhelming support of our brothers and sisters from all over the world and our beloved continent of Africa.

"As one of the largest tourism marketing events on the African calendar and in the top three on the global calendar, this event will see the stakeholders meet, engage and share with the world inspiring stories of resilience and innovation in tourism shown throughout the pandemic," he said.

Ravi Pillay, the KZN MEC for Economic Development, Tourism and Environmental Affairs said despite the continuing pandemic, the unrest, the floods and a weakened operating environment, tourism survived the past two years, and is now ready to be reignited for the benefit of all in the

province, our country and the continent. "Tourism plays a hugely important role in assisting our country to make its mark on the map of Africa and the globe. "The return of Africa's Travel Indaba to the Durban ICC after a two-year absence is the strongest indication that the African continent's tourism sector is well on the road to recovery," she said. While the Durban ICC was a bustling hub of activity for Africa's Travel Indaba, with delegates attending meetings or visiting the various exhibitions, only 50% of the convention centre's capacity was allowed to be filled and social distancing was maintained.

Barberton Makhonjwa Mountains World HERITAGE SITE

he Barberton Makhonjwa Mountains World Heritage Site (BMM-WHS) received inscription in July 2018 at the 42nd Session of the UNESCO World Heritage Committee held in the Kingdom of Bahrain in Manama. An area of about 113 137 ha was inscribed with land ownership varying from (State; private/ corporate; communal trusts and CPA (Communal Property Association). Most of these areas are managed by MTPA, including on behalf of some communal and private owners. This inscription is a major accomplishment which will no doubt contribute towards future socio economic growth of the region and boosting of tourism numbers to the province. The Barberton Makhonjwa Mountains contains the bestpreserved, oldest and most diverse sequence of volcanic and sedimentary rocks on Earth making it the outstanding universal value. These well researched outcrops provide a globally unique source of information and an outstanding field repository about the earliest conditions of the Earth's surface, beginning 3570 million years ago. Features of the early Earth

that are especially preserved include meteorite-impact fallback breccia's dating back 4.6 to 3.8 billion years ago, tidal bedding that formed the Moon was less than half as far away from earth as it is today as well as Komatites that represent the hottest lavas to have ever flowed on earth. From these rocks, more has been learned than from anywhere else about early surface processes, the making of continents, and the evolution of the primitive biosphere The Department of Economic Development (DEDT), as the Organ of state was appointed by DFFE: Minister as the Management Authority for the BMM-WHS in terms of section 8 of the WH Convention Act, 1999 (Act No.49 of 1999). MEC-DEDT then assigned the Management Authority to MTPA in August 2021 as the mandated entity responsible for tourism development and sustainable conservation management in the Province.

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LIMPOPO RE-AFFIRMS Its Unique Culture and Heritage at Africa's Travel Indaba



impopo Province is strategically located in the northern part of South Africa sharing borders with Zimbabwe in the north, Botswana in the west as well as Mozambique in the east. The Province is divided into five regions according to respective cultures. Capricorn is the central

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region predominantly occupied by Bapedi People. Waterberg is the largest region in the province with the majority of people being the Batswana people, while Vhembe region in the far north is dominated by Vhavenda and Vatsonga people. Mopani Region on the other hand, towards the Kruger National Park is dominated by Vatsonga whereas Sekhukhuni Region is dominated by Bapedi and Ndebele people. Some Ndebeles are also located in the eastern part of Sekhukhune while some Tswana speaking people can also be traced in the Waterberg District along Thabazimbi and Lephalale areas.

Limpopo is the only Province in South Africa with more than three cultural groups staying together in their original habitat and harmony. Other ethnic groups include the English, Afrikaners and people of Indian origin.

Unique to the province are breath taking routes such as Mapungubwe Heritage route that is part of the Greater Mapungubwe Transfrontier Park which borders Botswana and Zimbabwe in the west. The province also boasts Sekhukhune Heritage Route the home of Kings and Kingdoms with a rich history on the kingdoms of the Bapedi nation over many years. Limpopo is also home to African Ivory Route offering safari and cultural accommodation. Camps of the African Ivory Route are located within communities with some nature reserves surrounding the Kruger National Park. Limpopo is proud to have introduced Rixile Culture to Culture Route. Rixile means sunrise or the dawn of the day. The route focuses on attractions around Giyani and Phalaborwa but importantly also links Phalaborwa to the beach at Xai-Xai in Mozambique.
